# **Protecting Singapore's Coral Reefs**



#### WHAT ARE CORAL REEFS?

Coral reefs are impressive structures built up over many centuries by the marine organisms called coral. They use the calcium carbonate from seawater to build their skeleton as they bud and grow.


These coral reefs have been likened to oases\* in the 'deserts' of nutrient-poor waters. When corals grow together, they create a bright and colourful ecosystem that provides food and shelter for other marine animals. The reef is filled with crevices and caves perfect hiding places for the various reef organisms.



#### WHERE CAN WE FIND THEM IN SINGAPORE?

Singapore is a crucial home to more than 250 species of corals in her waters, which represents about a third of the world's species. This is incredible for a small island-nation. However, the impact of water pollution on the marine ecosystem is a grave concern. This is why SaveReefs SG works very closely with schools and organisations to protect Singapore's diverse marine life and environment.

The coral reefs of Singapore are located mainly in the islands south of Singapore. Contrary to the belief that they have been permanently devastated, reefs in Singapore still support rich marine life. In fact, they support more than 250 species of hard corals, 200 species of sea sponges and about 120 species of reef fish.

#### WHAT CAN WE DO TO PROTECT OUR CORAL REEFS?

Educate people on the importance of coral reefs.

Minimise diving in the coral reefs. Divers can break and harm corals.

Control water and chemical pollution near water sources.



Stop overfishing. Overfishing reduces the humber of herbivorous fish which feeds on algae. Too much algae can overwhelm a coral reef by competing for resources.

#### Support Our Marine Heritage, Take Part in 'Reef Explore' Tourl

You can join marine conservationists at the Coral Reef Conservation Centre (CRCC) located at Pulau Hantu - an island just minutes away from Singapore. All proceeds from the tour are donated to CRCC.

- Click on ReefExplore@PulauHantu.com to book your ferry and timing for the exploration. Each fully guided tour only lasts 20 minutes to ensure sustainability of the reef. Tickets are nontransferable.
- Exploration starts from 10 a.m. onwards. Do take note that all activities cease during high tide as visibility of the colourful coral reefs is compromised then.
- All tours are subject to weather conditions. Ferry tickets are nonrefundable but partial refund is allowed for tour cancellation.
- You can bring your snorkelling gear for an up-close experience.
- Place your camera or mobile phone in a waterproof bag if you want to capture the breathtaking colours of the reefs.
