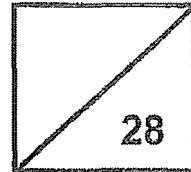

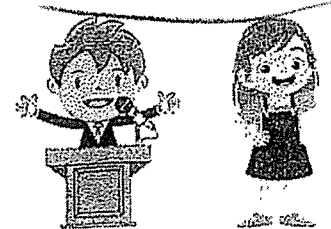

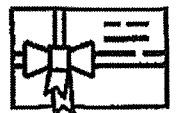

When the applause quietened, the principal announced, "One of our teachers nominated a student for a special award in recognition of her civic-mindedness. This award goes to Daisy Ang!"

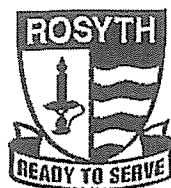
