We know what number to call for an emergency. Many of us assume that when (16) we call an emergency number, help will arrive quickly, no matter where we are in the world.

However in Kenya, there are more than 50 numbers for emergency services. Finding an emergency crew can be a potentially lengthy process there. The ambulance may take (17) two to three hours to arrive. To solve this problem, a mobile app called Flare compiles all (18) the available information on ambulances onto a single platform. Users of the app can choose the most appropriate services based on where the vehicle is as well as the expertise of the crew. (19)

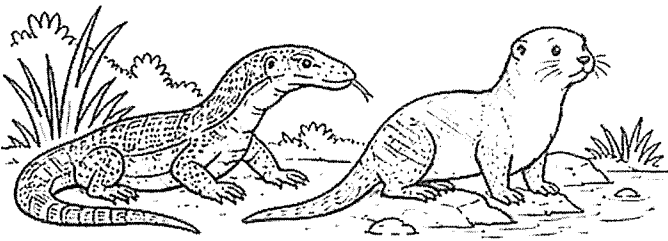

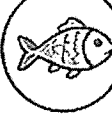

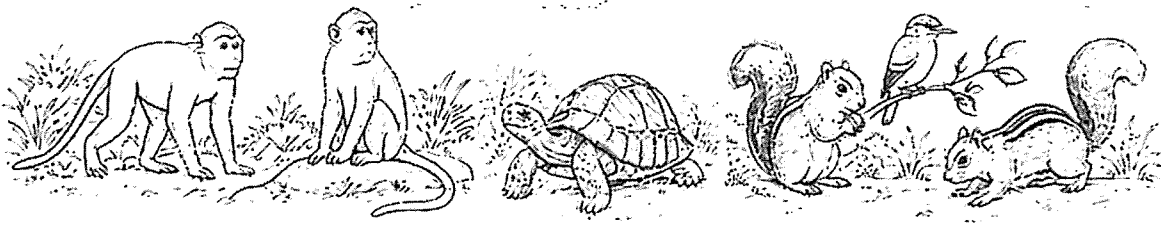

The excerpt below is taken from an interview with Park Officer, Ms Hazel Yoon.

Interviewer:	Why is it important for visitors to behave responsibly when they see wildlife?
Ms Hazel Yoon:	Singapore's parks and nature reserves are home to many wild animals. Seeing them can be an exciting experience, but visitors should remember that these animals are not pets. We should enjoy observing them without disturbing their natural behaviour.
Interviewer:	Could you tell us what can happen if people interact with wildlife in the wrong way?
Ms Hazel Yoon:	When animals become used to being around people, they may come too close to visitors or search bags and picnic areas for food. This can lead to unsafe situations for both people and wildlife. Wild animals are healthiest when they continue to look for food in their natural environment instead of relying on humans to feed them.
Interviewer:	What should visitors do when they come across wildlife?
Ms Hazel Yoon:	Observe the animals quietly from a safe distance and avoid touching or feeding them. If an animal appears injured or behaves in an unusual manner, report it to the relevant authorities so that trained officers can help.
Interviewer:	What message would you like visitors to remember?
Ms Hazel Yoon:	Every visitor has a part to play in protecting nature. By respecting wildlife and leaving animals undisturbed, we can help to keep our parks safe and enjoyable for everyone.

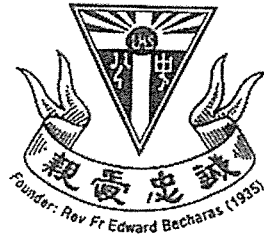

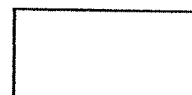

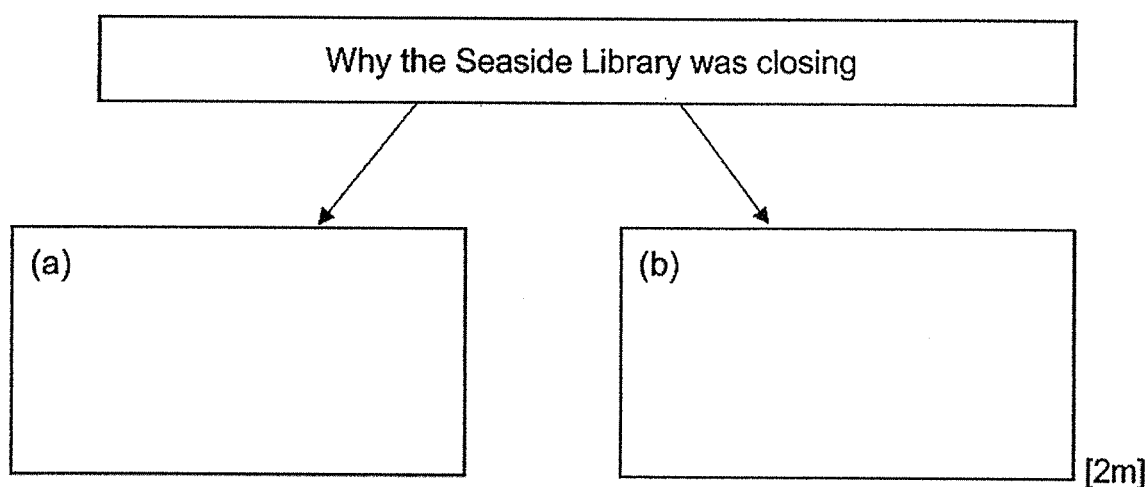
