When Jane turned on the hairdryer, Gato bolted in panic. In his hurry to escape, Gato's claws ripped the soft flesh on the underside of my lower left arm. Instinctively, I shoved Gato with all my strength and he landed with a thud, scurrying away almost immediately. The cut was deep and bled profusely. After stopping the bleeding, we decided no stitches were required. Jane helped me treat and dress the wound while I insisted no amount of discomfort would interfere with our day's plans. Soon, I began searching for Gato. "Gato!" I called several times, but there was no answer. The atmosphere in the house was heavy and I could not be certain of whose guilt I was reading. Finally, I found him huddling beneath the stairs, wide-eyed and trembling. As I held Gato close, I felt his heart racing. Kissing him on the head, I whispered, "It's alright. It was just an accident. I know you didn't mean to hurt me." I sat on the stairs holding and stroking him in my lap until he relaxed. When he finally seemed to have gotten over it, I released him — and wondered, briefly, if I had done the same. I dashed to the store for some snacks and while waiting in line to pay, I met my neighbour who lived next door. "What happened to your arm?" he asked, noting the bandage. After I explained, he responded with a raised brow, "Let me tell you one thing. If that had happened to me, it would be one dead cat! Accident or not!" I quickly left the store after paying, a sour taste in my mouth. Several weeks later, the wound was completely healed. However, in its place was a prominent white curved scar — almost three inches in length. While many would wish for it to fade, I liked the mark. I was reading in our room when Jane returned home from her piano lesson, throwing her bag down without a word. The moment she looked up and saw the book in my hand, the words flew out of her mouth. "I told you to use a bookmark! Why did you fold the pages? You know how much I love this book! This is exactly why I sometimes wonder if you even pay attention to anything I say! So much for being my sister." I could feel the cutting words rising in my throat. However, the soft brushing of fur at my leg distracted me and I looked down. 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The incident with Gato taught me that wounds seldom tell the whole story. His lashing out was **a reaction and not a malicious intent** — there is a difference between being the target and being the nearest thing at hand. People are not so different from animals in this way.

I took a slow breath and looked at Jane — **really looked at her** — and saw not anger but exhaustion behind her eyes. "It's alright," I said softly. "Do you want to talk about it?"

A long silence passed before her shoulders dropped, as though something she had been carrying all day had finally been set down. "I didn't mean what I said before. Everything had gone wrong during the piano lesson today and I've been feeling very stressed about the upcoming competition." Her eyes watered.

She walked over to me and took both my hands in hers. For a long moment she **simply held them and said nothing**. When she looked up, I knew I would never hold this incident against her.

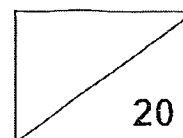

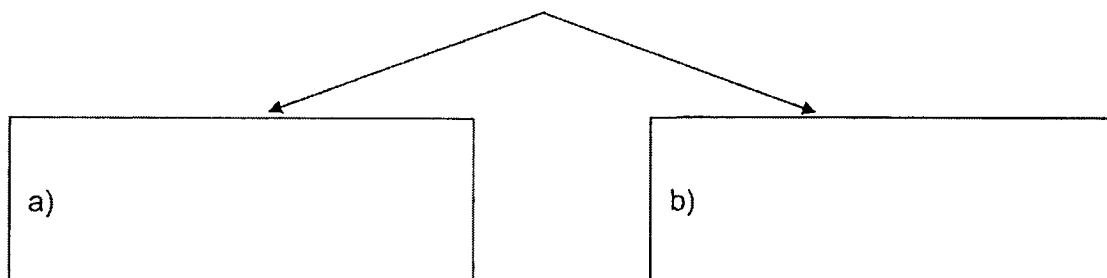
