Colin eyed Grandma warily. What was she going to show him? How special could something on the farm be? Colin followed his grandmother to the chicken coop, dragging his feet as he walked. There, hens clucked loudly, jostling for the grains scattered across the ground. Suddenly, one large hen shoved the others aside, pecking greedily while the smaller birds waited in quiet submission. Colin grimaced. Why did they let it push them around? 15

Grandma patted Colin on the shoulder gently. "What's with the frown?" she asked, pointing at the chickens. "See what they are doing? They know how to get food despite being smaller!" Colin watched more closely and noticed the smaller hens pecking at the grains when the larger one turned away. He started to smile. 20

By midday, dark clouds gathered. Wind whipped across the farm, rattling fences and tugging at the coop door. With a loud creak, the door swung open. Rain poured down, and the hens burst out in a flurry of feathers and panicked clucks.

"Grandma! The chickens!" Colin shouted, his heart racing. The birds scattered in all directions and showed no sign of turning back – some charged towards the open field while others darted under the bushes. Colin's first instinct was to sprint after them, but they were swifter than he was. 25

"Wait! They're not as bold as the large one!" Grandma called over the rain. Colin froze. What if they never came back? His chest tightened as he breathed hard and fast. Then he remembered the smaller hens at feeding time – how they had waited, watched, and chosen **the right moment**. Being impulsive would not help. 30

Taking a deep breath, Colin changed his strategy. He slowed his steps and softened his movements. Instead of chasing, he began guiding. He circled behind two hens, gently steering them towards the coop. He clapped lightly, not to scare them, but to direct them. One by one, a few hens began to return. He inhaled deeply, suppressing a smile. The large one, however, remained in the field, tense and alert. Each time Colin moved too quickly, it darted farther away. 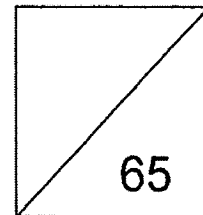
